Many of our supporters may have seen Shelby's smiling face featured on our website and collateral materials, yet you may not know her story. Take a moment to read more about the relationship between this dynamic young woman and UCP.

When Jennifer and Steve's twins, Shane and Shelby, were born 11 weeks premature, Shane suffered minimal effects, but Shelby was diagnosed with multiple challenges, including cerebral palsy.

Fortunately, familiar with UCP's Family Respite Care program, Shelby's parents knew they had a partner in caring for Shelby, who at one point required anywhere from five to 15 trips to therapy each week. In a household that includes two kids, four rescue dogs and at least one medically fragile foster baby at any given time, Jennifer and Steve continue to appreciate the opportunities UCP's respite care provides their family.


"I like being independent. I like doing stuff by myself and not having to ask. It makes me feel proud."











Shelby, now 14 ½ and a freshman at Bella Vista High School, is in great hands with her respite care provider, Theresa. After eight years of working together, Shelby thinks of Theresa as a big sister who continually provides her with new opportunities for learning and adventure. While Shelby's respite worker helps her with homework and keeps her safe, she also gives Shelby the chance to have a greater sense of independence. Shelby says that working with Theresa has taught her to accept herself for who she is.




She dreams of one day having her own home so that she and her best friend can live independently. Shelby also plans to write an autobiography so that she can share her story with others.

2013-2014 **Total Revenue** \$13,481,600






2013-2014 **Total Expenses** \$13,277,036



Most Utilized Programs & Services




Types of Disabilities Served
